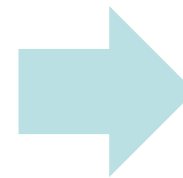
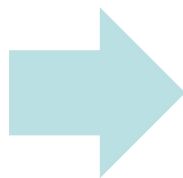

PROJECT RATIONALE

Problem Context

- Food and nutrition insecurity, climate vulnerability coupled with lack of resilient agricultural production skills, inputs and technologies
- Limited market access and low farmer's organizational capacity
- Policy and regulatory environment gaps for smallholders and rural development



Project Logic

- Invest in climate resilient agricultural farming and livelihood systems - community resilience plans and Farmer Field Schools (FFS)
- Strengthen farmers organizational capacity and value-chains
- Invest in market-oriented infrastructure
- Institutional capacity strengthening, policy and Implementation support

PROJECT COMPONENTS

COMPONENT 1: Resilient Agricultural Farming and Livelihood Systems



- Develop **310 participatory community resilience plans** to enhance community capacities for resilience and livelihood development

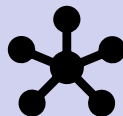


- Technical training and experimental learning for **93000 HH**, using Agropastoral / Farmer fields schools for increased production, resilience and nutrition



- Support **20 groups San People** through climate adaptive livelihood activities and forest management and conservation

COMPONENT 2: Improved Connectivity and Access to Markets



- Supply chain structuring and linkage to markets by building business management and development capacities of farmers' cooperatives and MSEs, and access to grants/credit



- Investments in market-access infrastructure (500km feeder roads, 50 small bridges, storage and processing facilities)

COMPONENT 3: Institutional Strengthening, Policy Support and Implementation Support Services



- Institutional Strengthening and Policy Support
- National Agricultural Extension System Strategy
- Slash and Burn/Shifting Cultivation
- Land Titling and Land-User Rights
