## **Planned project activities including those proposed and approved under lapse-of-time procedure 2010-2011**

1. At the second session of the Executive Board (EB/2), it was agreed that information on planned project activities would be presented to the Board regularly to enable representatives to keep abreast of developments in IFAD's project/programme pipeline and prospective lending and, should they so desire, to comment on planned operations at an appropriate stage of the development cycle.
2. To this end, part I of this document provides a comprehensive listing, by stage of processing and by region, of all projects and programmes that have entered the pipeline as part of results-based country strategic opportunities programmes or after approval of concept notes. In addition, as communicated to the Executive Board in September 2003 (EB 2003/79/R.29/Rev.1), IFAD has made available on its public website – at [www.ifad.org/operations/pipeline/index.htm](http://www.ifad.org/operations/pipeline/index.htm) – information on projects and programmes that have reached an advanced stage of design and are thus likely to be presented at a future session of the Board. Each of these operations is described in a two-page information note, which is updated on completion of each major step in the project cycle. As indicated to the Board at the ninety-seventh session (EB 2009/97/R.37), these information notes are now made available only in English and the language of the country concerned. Following discussions with Board members regarding the desirability of receiving information on planned interventions well in advance, dates for future key country meetings are provided to facilitate in-country discussion/consultation. Additional details of future country meetings and project- and programme-related documentation are available on request from the primary IFAD contact given in the document. Details of supplementary loans/grants to be considered by the Board during the 2010/2011 Board sessions that are part of approved, ongoing projects are not reflected in the current document or summarized in information notes.
3. At its ninety-eighth session held in December 2009, the Board endorsed the proposal to streamline the approval process for investment projects and programmes (EB 2009/98/R.15/Rev.1). For IFAD-funded projects/programmes, the Fund will apply two approval procedures: (i) the lapse-of-time procedure; and (ii) the standard procedure. Under the lapse-of-time procedure, eligible proposals meeting specific criteria will be considered approved by the Executive Board if no request for formal discussion by the Executive Board is received by a specified deadline. All IFAD-funded projects/programmes that do not fall under the lapse-of-time procedure will follow the existing standard procedure for Board approval.
4. According to the lapse-of-time procedure, proposals for projects/programmes submitted by the President pursuant to article 7, section 2(c) of the Agreement Establishing IFAD shall be considered approved if no request for consideration during a session of the Executive Board is received from any member within 30 days of the delivery of the document to the members. At its 100<sup>th</sup> session, the Board approved the following methodology and principles that IFAD Management will apply in implementing the lapse-of-time procedure (EB 2010/100/R.41): (i) except for large grants regulated by the IFAD Policy for Grant Financing, no projects/programmes will be deemed approved under the lapse-of-time procedure if the negotiated financing agreement is not delivered to members; (ii) negotiated financing agreements will be delivered to members at least five days prior to the lapse of 30 days following delivery of the proposals (i.e. President's reports and project/programme design documents); and (iii) in the event that the negotiated financing agreement is not posted on the Fund's website within the stipulated time, in accordance with (ii) above, and/or there are substantial changes with respect to the terms and conditions presented to members in the President's report, the proposal will be deemed withdrawn from the lapse-of-time process. Such proposal

may be resubmitted for approval later, either under the lapse-of-time procedure or at a regular session of the Executive Board.

5. To facilitate the implementation of this new process, it was agreed that the former Planned project activities document (now renamed Planned project activities including those proposed and approved under lapse-of-time procedure) would be enhanced by adding information on the proposed approval type. Therefore, part I-A of the document now contains a column showing the proposed approval type for each project/programme. Part I-B will include information about projects/programmes (and supplementary loans/grants) that are currently proposed for approval through the lapse-of-time procedure.
6. Part I-B will also provide a list of all projects/programmes (and supplementary loans/grants) approved through the lapse-of-time procedure in the preceding period. This procedure has also been adopted for global/regional and country grants exceeding US\$500,000 and approved or to be approved through the lapse-of-time procedure in line with the recently revised grant policy (EB 2009/98/R.9/Rev.1).
7. In September 2006, the Executive Board approved a new framework for a results-based country strategic opportunities programme (COSOP), as provided in document EB 2006/88/R.4. The results-based COSOPs will serve as the vehicle for entry of projects/programmes into IFAD's official pipeline. Some of these pipeline projects/programmes will be processed within the current 2010-2012 cycle of the performance-based allocation system (PBAS), while others will be included in subsequent PBAS allocation periods. Part II provides information on planned COSOPs and subregional strategic opportunities programmes (SRESOPs) and, where available, identifies dates of forthcoming country meetings and stakeholder consultation meetings.<sup>1</sup>
8. As agreed at the Board session in April 2001 (EB 2001/72/R.28), part III of this document provides information on all COSOPs and SRESOPs reviewed to date by the Operational Strategy and Policy Guidance Committee (OSC) as well as those reviewed by the Board.

### **Overview**

9. This document includes 62 projects/programmes that are in IFAD's official pipeline; others will be identified during the course of the year. The OSC is expecting to review concept notes for projects/programmes in Bosnia and Herzegovina, Honduras, Paraguay, Yemen and Zambia before year-end.
10. In terms of geographical distribution, the pipeline includes 10 projects/programmes in West and Central Africa, 11 in East and Southern Africa, 18 in Asia and the Pacific, 12 in Latin America and the Caribbean and 11 in the Near East and North Africa region.
11. IFAD also plans to present supplementary loans/grants in the context of ongoing projects/programmes: Rehabilitation and Community-based Poverty Reduction Project (Sierra Leone) and the South Kordofan Rural Development Programme (Republic of The Sudan). The grant for the latter programme will be provided in the form of a complementary contribution from Sweden.
12. IFAD is currently proposing to use the lapse-of-time procedure for the approval of six projects/programmes (Botswana, Central African Republic, Grenada, Guyana, Lesotho and Suriname) and a supplementary grant for the National Programme for Sustainable Human Development (Comoros) for a total of US\$37.68 million. Others will be identified in the course of 2010 and 2011. It is also proposing to use the same approval mechanism for global/regional grants totalling US\$19.40 million. All

proposals are subject to quality enhancement/quality assurance (QE/QA) review (for more details see part I-B).

13. The current session of the Board will review the COSOP for Senegal. The COSOPs for Mozambique and India are currently scheduled for presentation at the May 2011 Board session.
14. Planned interventions will continue focusing on priority areas as identified in the IFAD Strategic Framework 2007-2010, the future IFAD Strategic Framework 2011-2015 (to be reviewed by the Board in December 2010), the IFAD Medium-term Plan 2010-2012 and the relevant results-based COSOPs or concept notes. Through the agricultural and rural development projects/programmes it supports, IFAD is also making a specific contribution to the achievement of the first Millennium Development Goal (MDG1). Reducing rural poverty and promoting food security will continue to be at the centre of future investments, especially in sub-Saharan Africa.
15. It is envisaged that IFAD's new strategic framework will bring rural women to the forefront of its operations. IFAD views rural women as powerful agents of change: IFAD's experience demonstrates that investing in women can generate significant improvements in productivity and food security. Entire communities benefit socially and economically when women have access to water and land, education and training, and strong organizations.
16. The United Nations declared 15 October the International Day of Rural Women in recognition of "the contribution of rural women, including indigenous women, in enhancing agricultural and rural development, improving food security and eradicating rural poverty".
17. To illustrate IFAD's commitment to supporting rural women, below are some highlights of IFAD's planned interventions aimed at, inter alia, empowering women<sup>2</sup> and addressing their needs.
18. **West and Central Africa: Poverty Reduction Project in Aftout South and Karakoro - Phase II (Mauritania).** In 1994, the Government of Mauritania elaborated a national strategy for the promotion of women, which was subsequently updated in 2004. The strategy entailed a vast political campaign in favour of women, which resulted in the election of women to more than 20 per cent of local



administration and national parliament seats in 2006. In line with Mauritania's priorities, IFAD's projects and programmes all include strategies to promote women's empowerment and gender equality, addressing such areas as women's access to assets, their decision-making role in community affairs and representation in local institutions and their well-being. For instance, information, education and communication (IEC) campaigns for women were launched

with the support of the Poverty Reduction Project in Aftout South and Karakoro, in partnership with the Ministry of Social Welfare, Children and Family. The campaigns have had a significant impact on women's lives by providing them with access to information on citizenship, making them aware of the importance of education for girls, and informing them about women's rights, hygiene, reproductive health, etc. The campaigns have created a new space for discussion, dialogue and exchange for women and facilitated the emergence of women leaders (since the campaigns were run by the young women of the communities). In view of the excellent outcomes

and the strong demand to continue the activities, a second phase of the project will extend and scale up the IEC programmes, introducing some cost-sharing mechanisms so as to extend the coverage of these activities to a larger number of districts. Under this second phase, a network of IEC focal points will be set up and regular meetings will be held between the IEC focal points and their partners (for exchange of information, participatory evaluations, discussion of how to improve intervention modalities and introduce new IEC themes, etc). The IEC themes will continue to be based on material prepared by the Ministry of Social Welfare and modules concerning climate change will be introduced.

19. **East and Southern Africa: National Agricultural Programme (Eritrea).** The Government of Eritrea has policies that actively support equal opportunities for women. However, although some change is under way, the culture and traditions of Eritrea's ethnic groups continue to constrain the socio-economic activities of women, particularly in rural areas. While women have equal opportunities for employment, most of the activities undertaken by them are limited to the home and village, where they are already burdened by domestic chores, including childcare and fetching water and firewood. Past and ongoing projects in Eritrea have shown that women



are key to achieving household food security and nutrition goals. As such, project/programme design must ensure that women are adequately and appropriately targeted. Women must also be given priority in the allocation of land for newly developed small-scale and spate irrigation schemes, given that woman-headed households make up a significant part of the near landless and

landless population. These households constitute a specific target group of the National Agricultural Programme and reflect over 40 per cent of the households in the programme area. They will be prioritized in the land allocation for new irrigation areas. Small livestock investments (small stock, small-scale dairy, backyard poultry, apiculture) will be promoted particularly for the very poor and for women with limited access to land. Small stock and backyard poultry activities will be exclusively directed at woman-headed households. These will be complemented with improved animal health services, livestock feed production and stock route management to check disease spread and raise productivity. Efforts will be made to engage poor households – particularly those headed by women – in decision-making processes during implementation. The employment of women as extension officers and para-officers will be promoted and the National Union of Eritrean Women will receive support to provide technical and business training to women in livestock, agriculture and agriculture-related enterprises.

20. **Asia and the Pacific: Smallholder Livelihood Development Project in Maluku and North Maluku (SOLID) (Indonesia).** In rural Indonesia, the gender division of labour changed as a result of the conflict and women's role in the community has increased, along with their contribution to decision-making at the family and community levels. While women play an important role in agriculture and rural development, they are not provided with proper inputs or adequate training. Most extension workers are men. Mainstreaming gender considerations into all project activities will improve women's production and marketing skills and increase their participation in decision-making. In this way, social and economic development will be accompanied by a gradual transformation in gender relations. The project will address gender equality in addition to the needs of highly marginalized groups of women, such as woman-headed households. It will seek to increase women's economic well-being and status by: (i) enhancing the value of production and

processing activities dominated by women through skills training and introduction of



new technology; (ii) using a group approach (women only or mixed groups) for ensuring quality standards and marketing; (iii) supporting women entrepreneurs in providing business development services and venturing into value chain activities often dominated by men, e.g. marketing; (iv) building women's leadership skills to participate in the governance of

groups and their federations; (v) sensitizing men to women's enhanced role in value chain development; and (vi) building the capacity of groups and their federations and the ability of local government institutions to ensure gender-responsive service delivery.

21. **Latin America and the Caribbean: Territorial Development Programme (*Buen Vivir Rural*) (Ecuador).**

Ecuador's new Constitution, which came into force in 2008, considerably broadens the spectrum of women's rights in Ecuador addressing such areas as eliminating discrimination and inequality constraining women's access to productive assets, including land. The programme area is characterized by territorial diversity and social inequality and has a considerable presence of indigenous peoples in the Sierra and afro-Ecuadorians in the coastal region. Many households are now headed by women, and women play a major role in food production and marketing, as well as in agroenterprises such as floriculture businesses. In some parts of the Sierra, domestic violence – and inadequate access to legal and social services to confront this problem – are severe deterrents to women's participation. While not assuming a direct role in this regard, the programme will establish alliances to raise awareness of strategic issues such as gender-based violence and women's citizenship rights and will build on existing initiatives to promote gender equality. The programme will actively seek to involve women in all activities including the planning process, capacity-building, food security measures, income-generating activities and participatory monitoring and evaluation. The programme will facilitate the land acquisition process, particularly for single women or woman-headed households. It will also promote women's access to credit and micro-insurance programmes, leadership formation, training opportunities and other participatory learning experiences.



22. **Near East and North Africa: Integrated Rural Development Project (Azerbaijan).**

Women play a significant role in the rural economy of the project area – districts of Agdash, Yevlakh, Sheki and Oghuz – where agriculture is almost universally the sole economic activity. Recent data show that 40 per cent of the Azerbaijan female labour force works in agriculture (livestock production, horticultural production, particularly backyard production which provides a substantial contribution to the livelihoods) and agro-processing (in the home) where they have significant experience and skills. However, women tend to be ill-informed about good crop production and proper animal husbandry practices and hygienic agro-processing methods, despite the considerable time and energy that they dedicate to these areas. Their responsibilities and workload increase especially when men are absent (due to seasonal migrant work) or when they assume the role of

permanent households head (when men go abroad for long-term employment). Despite remittances, most of these households still need financial support. Under the project, targeting and benefits will systematically take gender considerations into account and rural women will be informed about the project activities and the opportunities that will be provided. Poor rural women will be expected to:

(i) participate in training courses and intensive on-farm demonstration programmes;



(ii) become direct beneficiaries of targeted farmer exchange visits; (iii) participate as entrepreneurs in microcredit schemes; (iv) submit applications for rural infrastructure (e.g. drinking water); (v) become members of the administrative council guiding the water users' associations; and (vi) participate in the project's annual stakeholder review and planning workshops.
