# Resources available for commitment

#### Note to Executive Board representatives

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## For: Approval

## **Recommendation for approval**

Pursuant to the Procedures for the Use of the Advance Commitment Authority (ACA), the President of the Fund is to report regularly to the Executive Board on the status of resources available for commitment, including the management of the ACA. At each session, the Executive Board is to approve the total resource commitment to be made through the ACA.<sup>1</sup> Additional use of ACA is being requested for approval at this session of the Board for US\$344.6 million. The Executive Board is hereby requested to authorize the President to conclude agreements for loans and grants approved by the Board at its 103<sup>rd</sup> session in September 2011 and for those to be approved through the lapse-of-time procedure as per attachment V to this document.

## Resources available for commitment

- 1. Attachment I contains a statement of resources available for commitment and attachment II lists amounts specifically excluded from resources available for commitment under IFAD's Regular Programme as at 30 June 2011.
- 2. Attachment III provides details of loans and grants approved by the Board during 2011. It also provides details of the loans and grants approved through the lapse-of-time procedure during 2011.
- 3. Attachment IV provides details of loans and grants proposed to the current session of the Board for a total amount of US\$377.2 million. Based on the exchange rate in force as at 30 June 2011, such loans and grants amount to SDR 235.5 million. Attachment IV also provides an indicative proposal of projects to be approved through the lapse-of-time procedure amounting to US\$79.4 million.
- 4. Attachment V shows commitments made using the ACA from 2001 to 2010. It also provides an analysis of net flows from 1 January to 31 August 2011, currently estimated at US\$226.8 million. In as much as the loans and grants commitments amount to US\$612.1 million,<sup>2</sup> and taking into consideration ACA of US\$40.7 million already approved this year, additional ACA amounting to US\$344.6 million is being requested at this Executive Board session. These figures will be updated in an addendum to this document to be tabled at the Board session.

### Advance commitment authority and its ceiling

5. Under article 7, section 2(b) of the Agreement Establishing IFAD, it is the responsibility of the Executive Board to determine the proportion of the Fund's resources to be committed to operations in any financial year. The Governing Council authorized the use of ACA at its twentieth session in February 1997 by amending the Agreement Establishing IFAD for that purpose. The procedures for ACA use during the Eighth Replenishment period are set out in resolution 154/XXXII/Rev.1, attachment B. The ceiling for ACA approved for the Eighth Replenishment period is based on seven years of reflows. The ACA requested at each Board session, if any, will represent the amount of loan and grant commitments in excess of the resources available for commitment. At year-end, taking into account net resources available for commitment and any additional ACA used during the year, the ACA carried forward will be adjusted accordingly. The

additional use of ACA in any given year will be the simple sum of the ACA approved by the Executive Board at its three sessions during the year.

#### Recommendation

6. Based on the resource position as at 30 June 2011, the Executive Board, having regard to article 7, section 2(b) of the Agreement Establishing IFAD and noting estimated net inflows for the eight-month period to 31 August 2011 amounting to US\$226.8 million, and Ioan and grant commitments amounting to US\$612.1 million,<sup>2</sup> and taking into consideration ACA of US\$40.7 million already approved this year, notes that additional ACA amounting to US\$344.6 million is being requested for approval at this session of the Board. The Executive Board authorizes the President to conclude agreements for Ioans and grants for approval by the Executive Board at its 103<sup>rd</sup> session in September 2011 and for those to be approved through the lapse-of-time procedure. In addition, the Board requests the President to report to the Executive Board at its next and subsequent sessions on the resources available for commitment, Ioans and grants approved, and the use of ACA.
