Recommendation for approval

The Executive Board is invited to approve the recommendation for the proposed revision of the lapse-of-time procedure, as contained in paragraph 12.

Revision of the lapse-of-time procedure for approval of IFAD-funded projects and programmes

A. Introduction

- 1. An information paper reviewing the lapse-of-time (LOT) procedure for approval of IFAD-funded projects and programmes was submitted to the 105th session of the Executive Board.¹ In paragraph 13 of that document, Management indicated that it might present a proposal to further refine the LOT procedure to the current session of the Board.
- 2. This paper provides an outline of the projects and programmes approved under the LOT procedure since its establishment in December 2009, and summarizes the lessons learned in the course of the procedure's implementation to date. It also provides a recommendation for approval by the Board that will expand application of the procedure.

B. Background

- 3. The application of the LOT procedure was approved by the Executive Board at its ninety-eighth session to streamline the approval process of projects and programmes and enable the Board to devote more time to strategic policies and oversight responsibilities during its sessions.²
- 4. The procedure is governed by rule 24 of the Rules of Procedure of the Executive Board. Under this procedure, eligible proposals are not placed on the agenda of the Executive Board session but rather posted on IFAD's website and communicated to Board Members for approval on a lapse-of-time basis. Proposals are deemed approved by the Executive Board if no request for consideration at a Board session is received by a specified deadline.
- 5. During the same ninety-eighth session, it was determined that, unless otherwise decided by the Board, rule 24 would not be applied when the amount of project or programme financing exceeded SDR 10 million (approximately US\$15 million), and that IFAD Management would have the right, irrespective of the amount of financing proposed, to decide to present a project to the Board for formal discussion.³ The LOT procedure would also extend to all large grants with the exception of grants to the for-profit private sector.⁴
- 6. Subsequently, at its 100th session, the Executive Board set out the methodology and the principles to be followed by Management in delivering the proposals to Members for approval under the LOT procedure.⁵ Internal LOT guidelines were adopted in order to guide staff on the steps to be followed when submitting proposals for LOT approval. The first grant and the first loan were approved under this procedure in September and December 2010 respectively.

C. Projects and grants approved under the lapse-of-time procedure

7. Since the introduction of the LOT procedure, the Executive Board has approved on a LOT basis: (i) seven projects for a total value of US\$58.06 million (appendix I); (ii) four supplementary loans for existing projects and a project under the Spanish Food Security Cofinancing Facility Trust Fund (Spanish Trust Fund) for a total value of US\$20.60 million (appendix I); and (iii) 52 grants for a total value of US\$67.85 million (appendix III).

- 8. While the LOT procedure has facilitated the approval of a significant number of loans and grants, not all projects that were eligible were processed under this procedure. From December 2010 to April 2012, 19 projects with a financing size of less than US\$15.0 million, for a cumulative IFAD financing amount of US\$184.23 million, were approved under the standard procedure, despite being eligible for LOT approval (appendix II). This is for two reasons: first, staff members were given a choice between the two approval procedures; and second, Management exercised caution and used the LOT procedure only selectively, as it was a new procedure. The LOT procedure has worked well. In fact, of all the proposals submitted under this procedure, only one grant proposal was subsequently submitted to the Board under the standard procedure at the request of an Executive Board representative. In this light, in future most projects that are eligible will be submitted for approval under that LOT procedure.
- 9. One grant was approved under the standard procedure, as it was not eligible under the LOT procedure given that the recipient of the financing was a for-profit private sector entity (appendix IV).
- 10. It is also noteworthy that, from December 2010 to April 2012, 12 supplementary loans and grants for existing projects, each with a financing amount of less than US\$15.0 million, for a total value of US\$49.54 million were approved under the standard procedure (appendix V). Based on Management's choice to do less than was otherwise permitted by the decision of the Executive Board, these were not submitted under the LOT procedure. Indeed, in approving the internal LOT guidelines, Management decided that a prudent approach would be followed, which meant, inter alia, that with respect to supplementary financing of existing projects and programmes, only those reflected in a new financing agreement would be eligible for LOT approval.

D. Lessons learned and areas for further improvements

- 11. While the LOT procedure has been in operation for a relatively short period and thus the lessons learned are still not definitive, the experience gained so far shows that further improvements can be made in the following areas:
 - (a) Projects with relatively larger financing have recently become more common. This is mainly due to the emphasis that IFAD is placing on enhancing institutional efficiency, while improving or at least maintaining the impact

that its assistance has on the rural poor. This process is timely and needs to be further intensified in order to achieve additional institutional efficiency. In this light, the Board should consider increasing the maximum amount of financing allowed under the LOT procedure from the current level of US\$15.0 million to US\$25.0 million. Had a US\$25.0 million limit been applied during the last five Board sessions (December 2010-April 2012), 16 of the 35 projects submitted under the standard procedure could have been presented under the LOT procedure. This would have reduced the Board's workload in approving projects in-session to eight projects – about two projects on average per Board session. (Appendix VI provides a breakdown by size of projects valued above US\$15.0 million approved during those five Board sessions.)

- (b) The current guidelines permit using LOT approval for supplementary loans/grants presented in new financing/grant agreements only. Supplementary financing involving amendments to existing financing/grant agreements are currently not eligible for LOT approval. In hindsight, Management considers this cautious approach unwarranted. Accordingly, the LOT guidelines should be revised to allow supplementary loans and grants, involving amendments to existing financing/grant agreements, to be processed under the LOT procedure.
- (c) Since the LOT procedure was new to IFAD, Management used this procedure only selectively. Given that the procedure has functioned smoothly and as expected, it should be applied to all eligible projects, unless Management deems that the project/programme proposal requires Board discussion. This will ensure that the number of projects submitted to the Board for in-session discussion, using the standard procedure, will be significantly reduced.

E. Recommendation

12. The Executive Board is invited to approve an increase in the lapse-of-time procedure ceiling as follows:

Unless otherwise decided by the Executive Board, it is understood that rule 24 of the Rules of Procedure of the Executive Board shall be applied for projects and programmes financing not exceeding SDR 17 million (approximately US\$25 million). However, IFAD Management reserves the right, as it deems necessary, to present a project or programme to the Board for discussion irrespective of the amount of its financing.
