Overview of supplementary funds received, committed and used in 2015

I. Introduction

- 1. Supplementary funds are grant resources received and administered by IFAD, on conditions mutually agreed between IFAD and the donor(s), for the benefit of the Fund's developing-country Member States. Unlike the resources mentioned in article 4 of the Agreement Establishing IFAD, supplementary funds are not under IFAD's ownership and are not "without restriction as to use".¹ Supplementary funds include resources provided by Member States, non-Member States and other sources for project cofinancing, technical assistance, thematic activities and sponsorship of individual's participating in IFAD's Associate Professional Officer (APO) Programme.
- 2. Supplementary funds play a key role in IFAD's overall operating model. As grant cofinancing for IFAD-supported projects, they soften the overall terms of the financing package for the borrowing government, provide opportunities to pilot innovative activities, improve donor coordination, and reduce the burden on recipients compared with parallel cofinancing. Thematic supplementary funds enable IFAD to undertake work that cannot be funded by the administrative budget, or through the PBAS or grant allocation systems. They are a major source of funding for IFAD's thematic work concerning indigenous peoples, farmers' organizations, remittances and other topics of central importance to IFAD's mission.
- 3. They also provide critical financing for non-lending activities at the country level, particularly for knowledge management, policy engagement, partnership-building, technical assistance and innovation all priority activities for which limited funds are available through the administrative budget or PBAS/grant allocations. Collaboration among the Rome-based agencies also benefits significantly from supplementary funds, with at least nine of the ongoing agreements involving formal partnerships between IFAD and one or more of the other Rome-based agencies.
- 4. As required by President's Bulletin PB/2013/12, this information note serves to update the Executive Board on all supplementary funds received, committed and used during the 2015 fiscal year. The following sources of supplementary funds are being included for the first time in 2015: the Adaptation Fund (AF), Global Environment Facility (GEF) and GEF-administered Least Developed Countries Fund (LDCF) and Special Climate Change Fund (SCCF), as well as the Global Agriculture and Food Security Program (GAFSP). Information is also provided separately on the APO Programme, although this is not included in overall calculations.

II. Overview of IFAD's 2015 supplementary funds portfolio

5. Status. As of 31 December 2015, IFAD's current² supplementary funds portfolio consisted of 116 agreements with 16 member states and their organizations,³ and 13 international organizations, funds and other partners,⁴ for a total amount of

US\$724.1 million.⁵ A snapshot of current agreements is provided in table 1 of the appendix.

- 6. Funds mobilized during 2015. IFAD mobilized US\$67.0 million in supplementary funds under 15 new agreements and two top-ups to existing agreements. This includes new agreements with the ADFD, B&MGF, European Union (represented by the European Commission), FAO, Italy, Republic of Korea, Luxembourg, Switzerland and World Food Programme (WFP). These agreements support interventions to increase livestock and agricultural productivity, improve nutrition, empower farmers' organizations, strengthen the impact of remittances in rural areas, and support agricultural research. Top-ups were provided by Estonia for the ongoing thematic agreement and by the European Union for the ongoing Kenya Cereal Enhancement Programme Climate-Resilient Agricultural Livelihoods Window (KCEPCRAL).
- 7. A further 11 project proposal grants were approved for the GEF (nine), LDCF (one) and SCCF (one) during 2015, for projects with a total planned value of US\$80.9 million. As of 31 December 2015, design was still in progress for nine projects and two had been endorsed (of which one had begun implementation).
- 8. Details of all agreements signed in 2015 are provided in tables 2A and 2B of the appendix.
- 9. Funds received during 2015. IFAD received total supplementary fund payments of US\$88.4 million relating to agreements signed in 2015 and previous years. 53 per cent of this amount was received from the European Union and 25 per cent from GAFSP, followed by Netherlands, GEF, Switzerland, Germany and Denmark respectively. Payments under supplementary fund agreements are made according to either a payment schedule specified in the agreement, or the liquidity requirements of the activities being financed on the basis of annual workplans and budgets. Details of all funds received during 2015 are provided in table 3 of the appendix.




Figure 1 Thematic distribution of the supplementary funds portfolio

- 10. Thematic distribution. As shown in figure 1, the current supplementary funds portfolio focuses on the following themes (in order of their share of the total):
 - (a) Natural resources management and climate change (28 per cent), primarily relating to support provided by the climate and environment funds (AF, GEF, LDCF and SCCF). These funds have played an important role in facilitating IFAD's climate mainstreaming agenda.
 - (b) Food production and nutrition (24 per cent), including activities that support sustainable and nutrition-sensitive agricultural production. This involves funds received through GAFSP and other partners for project cofinancing, as well as thematic support from Canada, Germany, Ireland and Switzerland for mainstreaming nutrition and food loss reduction.
 - (c) Value chain development and financial inclusion (22 per cent), including support for small and medium-sized enterprises, market infrastructure, rural finance, the Financing Facility for Remittances (FFR) and funds provided to support risk management through the Platform for Agricultural Risk Management and the IFAD-WFP Weather Risk Management Facility.
 - (d) Agricultural research for development (15 per cent), which primarily consists of funds provided by the European Union in support of the Consultative Group on International Agricultural Research (CGIAR).
 - (e) Support to farmers' organizations (7 per cent), including all funds provided to support IFAD's assistance to these organizations, for example through the Support to Farmers' Organizations in Africa Programme (SFOAP) and the Farmers' Forum.
 - (f) Support to enhance the impact of IFAD operations (4 per cent), including on gender, through support to studies, evaluation and technical assistance.




Figure 2 Regional distribution of the supplementary funds portfolio

- 11. Regional distribution. Figure 2 illustrates the regional distribution of the 2015 portfolio. Almost 50 per cent benefits sub-Saharan Africa (East and Southern Africa [ESA] and West and Central Africa [WCA]), 4 per cent benefits Latin America and the Caribbean (LAC), 7 per cent benefits Asia and the Pacific (APR), and 15 per cent benefits the Near East, North Africa, Europe and Central Asia (NEN). The remaining 24 per cent is global, or without a specific regional focus, including 15 per cent dedicated to supporting agricultural research through CGIAR.

12. Use of funds. The largest share of the current supplementary funds portfolio (62 per cent) is channelled directly to the cofinancing of IFAD-supported grant and

investment projects. A further 23 per cent is allocated to single- and multi-donor thematic facilities and country-specific thematic agreements. These provide an important source of funding for non-lending activities at country and regional levels. Finally, 15 per cent is allocated directly to support agricultural research through CGIAR.

- 13. Sources of funds. The European Union is currently the main source of supplementary funds. As of 31 December 2015, there were a total of 20 ongoing agreements between IFAD and the European Union, accounting for 43 per cent of the total value of the portfolio, or US\$313.6 million. Global climate and environment funds (AF, GEF, LDCF and SCCF) account for a further 23 per cent, or US\$167.8 million, and GAFSP accounts for 15 per cent, or US\$106.2 million. Member States and their organizations provide 17.5 per cent of current supplementary funds, and about 1 per cent comes from other sources, including other international partners such as FAO, UNCDF, UNIDO, the UNDP Multi-Partner Trust Fund (financed by Norway and Sweden), B&MGF and Government of Flanders.
- Member States providing the largest amounts of supplementary funds under the current portfolio are: Netherlands (US\$35.1 million), Italy (US\$23.5 million), Canada (US\$14.1 million), Switzerland (US\$9.99 million) and Spain (US\$8.5 million).
- 15. Member States provide 35 per cent of their supplementary funds as project cofinancing, with the remainder for thematic support for research, improved access to rural finance and markets, farmers' organizations and other topics. The international organizations, funds and facilities provide supplementary funds primarily for project cofinancing (68 per cent). The European Union, in particular, is also an important source of thematic support for agricultural research, followed by value chain development and financial inclusion, food production and nutrition, and farmers' organizations. Overall supplementary funds for project cofinancing are strongly focused on sub-Saharan Africa, accounting for 62 per cent of the total, followed by NEN, with 24 per cent.
- 16. A statement of cumulative supplementary contributions by source, since 1978, is included annually in the IFAD consolidated financial statements submitted to the Executive Board. The largest Member State contributors of supplementary funds have been Belgium (US\$161.5 million, including the Belgian Fund for Food Security), Netherlands (US\$116.3 million), Italy (US\$57 million) and United Kingdom (US\$35.9 million). Other major contributors (each with US\$10-30 million in cumulative supplementary fund contributions) are Canada, Denmark, Finland, Norway, Spain, Sweden and Switzerland.⁶ The main contributions from Non-Member States and other sources are from the European Union (US\$491.9 million), GAFSP (US\$106.2 million), the GEF (US\$106.0 million) and LDCF/SCCF (US\$88.3 million).
- 17. APO Programme. IFAD's APO Programme, under which member governments sponsor young, university-trained individuals for employment at IFAD, is also included in the overall category of supplementary contributions. During 2015, 8 new APOs were recruited, bringing the total number under contract at 31 December 2015 to 12. Of these, seven are stationed at IFAD headquarters and the remainder are in IFAD Country Offices in Kenya, Nigeria, Senegal and Sudan. The sponsors of these APOs are Netherlands (three, of which two are nationals of List C Member States), Germany (three), Italy (two), Switzerland (two), Denmark (one) and Finland (one). A total of US\$2.2 million was received for the APO Programme in 2015.
- Agreements completed and closed during 2015. During 2015,
 supplementary fund agreements were financially closed. As of 31 December 2015, 18 other agreements were in the process of being closed, including two, with

Finland and the OPEC Fund for International Development (OFID) respectively, which were partially cancelled. Details of all agreements completed and closed in 2015 are provided in tables 4A and 4B of the appendix.

III. Conclusion and strategic directions

- 19. The 116 current supplementary fund agreements, in the amount of US\$724.1 million, demonstrate the significant role played by supplementary funds in financing IFAD-led operations. They also show the value of the supplementary funds instrument as a tool for engaging with a wide range of partners, from the United Nations and other international organizations, to foundations and major multilateral donors such as the European Union.
- 20. In the coming years, IFAD will continue mobilizing supplementary funds, alongside its core resources, to be used as grant cofinancing for IFAD's investment portfolio, and to continue IFAD's work on thematic issues and non-lending activities at global, regional and country levels.
- 21. IFAD is actively seeking supplementary contributions for the Facility for Refugees, Migrants, Forced Displacement and Rural Stability (FARMS) to leverage IFAD's comparative advantage in addressing rural dimensions of the current forced displacement and migration crisis.
- 22. Supplementary funds will also play a key role in the second phase of the Adaptation for the Smallholder Agriculture Programme, where the target is mobilization of US\$100 million in supplementary funds to support efforts to mainstream climate issues in IFAD's operations, including through implementation of the Social, Environmental and Climate Assessment Procedures (SECAP), and to finance capacity-building, technical assistance and other support to recipients of IFAD funds.

With initial support of the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation (US\$1 million) in 2008 IFAD and the WFP established the joint Weather Risk Management Facility (WRMF), to develop index insurance with the World Food Programme. Since 2008 the WRMF has been conducting research, building capacity, and implementing initiatives to improve index insurance product offerings and the way they are delivered. In 2014 France agreed to support the Phase II of the project 'Improving weather risk management in Sub-Saharan Africa: satellites for insuring smallholders' with EUR 500,000. The IFAD-WFP WRMF has been working to address the challenges weather risk (particularly drought) poses for smallholders producing crops in rural areas and to evaluate and review 36 weather index insurance programmes. A main challenge is that, to develop an index insurance contract, historical daily data sets (ideally of about 20 years or more) are necessary, as well as the capacity to capture current data in order to know when a payout should be triggered.

Canada supported the launch of the initiative as a multi-donor facility. Germany subsequently made a contribution with country specific (Brazil, Zambia, Ghana, Indonesia) and sector focused earmarking that promote value chains within specific crops, fish or livestock high nutritional contents relevant for smallholder production and consumption. The two projects are mutually reinforcing.
