The Executive Board is hereby invited to consider the amendments to the President's report on the Participatory Agriculture and Climate Transformation Programme (EB 2022/137/R.31). The changes to the document are reflected as follows: deleted text with strikethrough, added text underlined.

Page iii, Financing summary:

Page 1, paragraph 1:

"1. The economy of the Federal Democratic Republic of Ethiopia has been seriously impacted in the past three years, notably due to the global effects of COVID-19, drought, supply shocks in key commodities and internal conflict in the country's northern regions. The conflict involving Tigray and parts of the Afar and Amhara regions, which had subsided following the declaration of a humanitarian truce by the Government in December 2021, resumed in August 2022. On 2 November 2022, the Government of Ethiopia and the Tigray People's Liberation Front signed a cessation of hostilities agreement that has stopped the conflict in these areas."

Page 2, paragraph 11:

"11. **Geographic area of intervention**. PACT will be implemented in five the following regional states of Ethiopia: Amhara; Oromia; Southern Nations, Nationalities and Peoples' Region; Amhara; Sidama; and Somali; and South West Ethiopia. Selection of the regions was based on: (i) a large rural population; (ii) high poverty prevalence; (iii) high rate of food and nutrition insecurity; (iv) the presence of economic opportunities/markets relevant to PACT; (v) impacts of climate change and natural resource degradation; and (vi) relative security (in consultation with the Government of Ethiopia). Additional regional states may be added in accordance with the above criteria and subject to additional funding."

Page 4, paragraph 20:

"20. Total programme costs amount to US\$ 185.559 179.593 million over the sevenyear implementation period. The financing gap of US\$2.011 million may be sourced through subsequent performance-based allocation system cycles or cofinancing identified during implementation."

Page 4, paragraph 22:

"22. PACT will be funded by the following financiers: (i) IFAD, with an Eleventh Replenishment of IFAD's Resources (IFAD12) performance-based allocation grant of US\$78.2 million and a US\$11.553 10.476 million grant through ASAP+; (ii) a GTM/BMGF grant of US\$ 4.990 5.011 million; (iii) a EC grant of US\$19.953 16.86 million; (iv) a contribution of US\$2.011 million from a yet-to-be-identified financier; (v) the Inclusive Green Financing Initiative (IGREENFIN), with a loan of US\$35.013 million, subject to Green Climate Fund approval; (vi) a Government of Ethiopia contribution of about US\$24.309 23.886 million (including waived duties and taxes and a direct contribution); (vii) the private sector (enterprises, associations, unions, cooperatives), with a contribution of US\$3.657 3.673 million; and (viii) beneficiaries, with about US\$6.076 4.459 million in contributions (in kind and cash). The overall recurrent costs are 4.2 5.4 per cent for the total programme, while under IFAD financing they are 8.46 8.4 per cent, which is within acceptable limits."

Page 8, paragraph 25:

"25. Beneficiary households will increase their annual net financial income; the aggregate financial internal rate of return is 33.9 per cent, well above the opportunity cost of capital in Ethiopia (7.9 per cent). The economic internal rate of return is 17 17.7 per cent, well above the opportunity cost of capital. The economic net present value is estimated at about US\$83.7 85 million over the 20-year period of the analysis. The discount rate employed in the economic analysis is 5 10 per cent."

Page 12, paragraph 53, Recommendation:

"53. I recommend that the Executive Board approve the proposed financing in terms of the following resolution:

RESOLVED: that the Fund shall provide a Debt Sustainability Framework grant to the Federal Democratic Republic of Ethiopia in an amount of seventy-eight million two-hundred thousand United States dollars (US\$78,000,000) (US\$78,200,000) and upon such terms and conditions as shall be substantially in accordance with the terms and conditions presented herein."
