Addendum

- 1. For the information of the Executive Board, and as stated in document EB 2009/98/R.23, Management has prepared an update of the estimated resources available for commitment under IFAD's Regular Programme. The aforementioned document had estimated an additional advance commitment authority (ACA) requirement of US\$173.2 million. Taking into account an increase in the estimated net inflows for the 12-month period, the ACA now being requested at this session is US\$13.5 million. The increase in the estimated net inflows is due primarily to US\$106.4 million of contributions, US\$41.0 million of loan reflows and US\$9.2 million of investment income, partially offset by additional outflows of US\$22.5 million for operating expenditures.
- 2. Attachment II shows estimated total net resource inflows from 1 January to 31 December 2009 of US\$639.5 million. Loan and grant commitments proposed to the current session of the Board total US\$287.7 million. Taking into account these net flows and commitments, as well as loans and grants already approved of US\$441.8 million, and ACA already approved at the April session of US\$76.5 million, additional ACA of US\$13.5 million needs to be approved at this session of the Executive Board.

Recommendation

3. The Executive Board, having regard to article 7, section 2(b) of the Agreement Establishing IFAD and in accordance with paragraph III.17 of Governing Council resolution 141/XXIX/Rev.1, is therefore invited to note the present shortfall in resources in the period of an estimated US\$13.5 million due to estimated net inflows for the period January to December 2009 amounting to US\$639.5 million, the loans and grants presented for approval amounting to US\$287.7 million, and the loans and grants already approved of US\$441.8 million and ACA already approved at the April session of US\$76.5 million. As a result, additional ACA of US\$13.5 million is now being requested.
