Addressing inter-related global challenges



Human-caused climate change is leading to losses and damages to nature and people.

Vulnerable communities who have contributed the least to climate change are the most affected.



Gender inequalities are one of the root causes hindering rural transformation. Women make up 43% of the agricultural labour but less than 5% of all landholders in N Africa and W Asia and only 15% in SSA. Women receive less than 1% of climate finance.



The number of people who could not afford a healthy diet in 2021 increased to 3 billion people. 22% of children in the world under 5 were stunted, 6.7% were wasted 5.7% were overweight.



85% of the world's 1.2 billion young people live in developing countries, mostly in rural areas. Nearly 71 million are unemployed, making it challenging for rural youth to secure decent jobs.

"Mainstreaming" provides a comprehensive approach that unifies initiatives under a shared framework to collectively address these challenges ensuring no one is left behind





Status of commitments related to climate for 2022 project designs





Status of commitments related to social inclusion for 2022 new project designs




Based on the current pipeline that includes seven projects prioritising Indigenous Peoples, the target of ten will be met by end of IFAD12.
